Chaplain's Chatter


Now into the second week of Lent, we might still be wondering why we are even observing Lent this year. Haven't we had enough of Lent?! It feels like we'd had of whole year of "giving up". A year in which a microscopic virus has globally caused us so much loss and hardship. Even beyond the sickness and deaths, has been the loss of economy for so many. Globally, we have seen a surge of racism, and extreme weather events caused by climate change. And here at home, we have had to give up seeing our friends, hugging our grandchildren, and any travel beyond our borders. It can feel overwhelming to find ourselves in the second Lenten season since this pandemic started.

But then, we might ask ourselves, "Is giving up something" really what Lent is all about? Perhaps this is an opportunity to look a little deeper into the spiritual reason for Lent. Hasn't the deeper purpose always been to take a step back from our day-to-day habits and entanglements, to atone for our sins (thinking of the ongoing, often unthinking ways we interact with people around us, or world, and with God) Lent gives us a chance to reflect deeply on the way our imperfect selves get in the way of our spiritual growth? Hence the "focus" on our giving up by fasting on something of our physical pleasures, — in order to focus on our spiritual lives.

The heart of Lent remains unchanged. Yes, we can and should acknowledge and grieve for all the losses we've suffered. But the true, profound core of Lenten discipline is not about giving up at all – it's about drawing closer to God (and closer to others, to a just world, to a better and more faithful walk of discipleship). So, on the one hand, while we have gone through and are going through some very difficult times, our Lenten soul-searching work is the same. We look at our lives and at the things in our lives that separate us from God, and we endeavor to follow ever more faithfully in Jesus' footsteps. Our Lenten hymn continues to be "Just for a closer walk with thee".

Hamburger Soup by Barbara Monasch

1 1/2 lb. ground beef (and/or pork mix)

1 onion, finely chopped (1 package Onion Soup mix)

28 oz can tomatoes (crushed or minced)

2 c. water

3 cans consume (1 litre box of Campbell's beef stock no salt added)

1 can tomato soup (I change for tomato paste)

4 carrots chopped fine (Half a package of diced or minced carrots)

1 bay leaf

3 stalks celery (1 c. frozen assorted vegetables)

1/2 t. thyme

3/4 c. pearl barley

Pepper to taste

Brown meat and onions in large pot. Drain well. Return to pot. Combine all other ingredients and add to meat and onions. Simmer covered for at least two hours.

Northern Clergy Families Fund

For the past four years the chaplain for the Canadian Mothers' Union has been the Rev Tom Stradwick of the Parish of Hampton in New Brunswick. Rev. Tom came to Hampton from the Council of the North. When Rev. Tom was asked by Alice Kennedy, Canadian Mothers' Union President and a parishioner, to be the Chaplain for the Canadian Mothers' Union, he readily agreed because his family had been the recipient of a gift from the Northern Clergy Families Fund many years before. He had never forgotten the generosity of the gift of \$950. It arrived, unanounnced, at a time when like most of the clegy families in the North they were faced with expenses.

The Northern Clergy Families Fund (NCFF) is an outreach project of the Canadian Mothers' Union. The Fund was started in 1974 to help isolated clergy spouses serving in the Dioceses of the North. Initially it was thought that the gift could be used for a holiday or trip home to see family and friends. That idea quickly changed, when clergy indicated that they needed the money for necessities. The fund changed from being specifically for spouses to being for clergy families in general.

Donations come from Mothers' Union branches, Anglican Church Women groups, churches and individuals. We were able to distribute 15 gifts of \$1000 to each recipient in 2020. The recipients are free to use the money for their specific needs. The gift offers clergy families a tremendous boost, providing opportunity to visit family, attend conferences, and cater to medical, travel, home and family needs as the following note attests.

"Please know that I feel so blessed to be a recipient of such a loving kindness at such a time as this. This year was been very trying and difficult for us as a family and as a church .yet through it all we really appreciate the wonders of God's working and provision through people like you. And though we live in a quite small remote town, having to travel to other nearer towns or city for our other necessities, the warmth and friendship of the people here is overwhelming. And this brings us great comfort and joy living here.

And with your generosity and Christian love, my family and I want to say over and over again: THANK YOU SO MUCH FOR YOUR GIFT OF \$1,000. It surely is a blessing from heaven through you. Again, THANK YOU. And we pray that the Almighty Father continually bless, protect and use you for His honour and glory. May God in His divine protection cover you and your family and keep you safe all the days. And may the Lord Jesus greatly reward your faithfulness in doing His ministry. May you have a very meaningful, fruitful New Year."

Another email simply says this, "I would like to extend my heartfelt thanks to you and the Canadian Mothers' Union for the very kind donation Michelle and I received yesterday. We are truly thankful and appreciate the warm letter that accompanied the cheque."

The recipients of the \$1000 gifts are selected on a rotational basis. The Northern Clergy Families Fund Coordinator contacts bishops in the Council of the North as funds permit. Each bishop is asked to submit the names of two clergy families who would benefit from the gift. Special or urgent requests are also considered.

The coordinator of the Northern Clergy Families Fund is Mothers' Union member, Linda Viau of Thunder Bay, Ontario.

Julia Chester Emery

Psalm 131:4 O Israel, wait upon the LORD, from this time forth for evermore.

Julia Chester Emery served as the national secretary of the Women's Auxiliary of the Board of Missions for forty years, from 1876 to 1916. For the Episcopal Church, perhaps her most significant and longest-lasting legacy is the United Thank Offering.

The little blue boxes are one of the first church things I clearly remember and looked forward to, long before I knew who Julia Chester Emery was. But it was her idea, brought to fruition by the Women's Auxiliary, that each time you are thankful, you would drop a coin into your little box. Once a year, these offerings were all gathered together. Everything that was collected was used to fund missions of the Episcopal Church. The United Thank Offering continues to this day, annually giving more than a million dollars to mission efforts in the Episcopal Church. Julia Chester Emery gave us all a lasting way to give thanks and to do good.


