


INTRODUCING NEWEST BOARD MEMBER

Moroccan Chickpea Salad submitted by Jennifer Tennant

FOR THE SALAD:

2/3 cup uncooked quinoa

2 cans reduced-sodium chickpeas (15 ounce cans), rinsed and drained

3 cups grated carrots pregrated or freshly grated from about 4 large/medium carrots, about 10 ounces

5 ounces baby arugula

1/3 cup toasted pistachios almonds, or pumpkin seeds (pepitas)

1/3 cup crumbled feta omit to make vegan

1/4 cup golden raisins or chopped dried dates

3 tablespoons chopped fresh mint

FOR THE DRESSING:

3 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil

3 tablespoons freshly squeezed lemon juice about 1 small lemon

1 teaspoon Dijon mustard

1 teaspoon maple syrup or honey

3/4 teaspoon ground chili powder

1/2 teaspoon kosher salt plus additional to taste

1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon



Instructions

In a medium saucepan, cook the quinoa according to package directions. While the quinoa cooks, place the chickpeas and carrots in a large serving bowl. In a small bowl or measuring cup (my favorite for easy pouring), whisk together the dressing ingredients: olive oil, lemon juice, Dijon, maple syrup, chili powder, salt, and cinnamon. Taste and adjust as desired.

Once the quinoa has finished cooking, fluff with a fork, then add to the serving bowl. Pour the dressing over the top, just until it is moistened, then stir to combine. Add the arugula (see recipe note if not eating all of the salad within a day or so) and stir again, adding a bit more dressing as desired. Sprinkle with the pistachios, feta, raisins, and mint. Enjoy immediately or refrigerate until ready to serve.

President's Purse

It is with grateful heart I have received the well wishes and donations from the branches for the President's Purse. It has been an honour to serve you.

After much consideration and prayer, I have decided that I would like the purse to go to the Northern Clergy Family Fund. This fund is for the families of clergy in the north and is administered by the Mother's Union.

This fund was started by the Mother's Union in 1974 as a travel fund for clergy wives to visit southern Canada and 1992 the name was changed, to The Northern Clergy Families Fund, which allows the fund to also be given to husbands of female clergy and to respond to the wider needs of families and now encompasses everything from shopping trips to medical treatments. Bishops in the Council of the North are contacted to submit names of two clergy families who may benefit from the funds. A no-strings attached \$1,000. cheque is sent to each of the families.

This fund is not to be confused with the new Council of the North Retired Clergy Fund which we are in the process of setting up.

I was invited to dinner at Hycroft... the beautiful home of the University Women's Club, Tuesday evening May 17. Following dinner, they presented a film called "IN THE NAME OF YOUR DAUGHTER". The film was about the bravest girls in the world...Tanzanian children who risk everything to escape from female genital mutilation/cutting. This film has been shown to the UK Parliament, the Netherlands, Australia and the World Bank to name some. The filmmaker and panellist, Giselle Portenier was present and spoke following the film. She is a Journalist from UBC and works as an activist and is the founding member of FGM Canada.

The film was hard to watch at times. These brave girls fled to a safe house that this most wonderful lady had started. Their average age was 10. She allowed them to stay as long as necessary to avoid cutting...something which both or one parent thought necessary. It is believed if you don't enjoy sex then you would not "Sleep Around". It is hard to believe a father would tie his daughter's hands behind her neck and remove her clitoris with a razor blade. Painful plus the chance of dying because of bleeding or an infection to name just a few of the horrors.

The girl only returns to her family after the family are educated and sign an agreement to not cut her. However, you can imagine the alienation and such the child endures if she returns. The government is trying to make it illegal and hopefully it stops with this generation. Prayers for these brave people.

The panel included the film maker plus Dr. Jan Christlaw, former President of BC Women's Hospital plus many other roles. Dr. Christlaw received the Order of Canada for her work in our world and abroad. N. Mawani moderated. She has worked endlessly here and abroad from women...especially Afghanistan and was also given the Order of Canada. Last Luna Amir, who works for immigrant services, housing projects and making people aware of FGM.

The main message of course was making the world aware and funding projects if possible, but starting here at home with education. It was a pleasure to attend.
